Berwick-upon-Tweed Division

Navigation skills learned were put to good use as the Guides completed a trail around Spittal, finishing with chips!



Other outdoor skills learned included; fire lighting with matches and fire sticks, making egg box firelighters, cooking toasties and s'mores and finishing the summer term with a beach barbeque.





By Autumn Term, Guides, Brownies and Rainbows were meeting indoors once again and taking part in a range of exciting activities. Rainbows worked to gain Stage 1 Skills for my Future and some girls gained their Book Lover badge.





As part of the Union Chain Bridge Project, Guides and Brownies were involved in learning more about bridge building and took part in several related STEM activities. Guides were fortunate to receive a grant from the British Science Association and had great fun making bristle bot robots, solar bracelets, soap roses and designing bridges using kits.

During Parliament Week, Guides thought about a change they would like to see locally, nationally or globally and how they could help achieve this. A great opportunity for the girls to learn debating skills.

Brownies made a Poppy craft and learned about the importance of Remembrance Sunday in preparation for their attendance at the service on 14th November 2021. Berwick Girlguiding Division was well represented in the parade at this local event.





Guides, Brownies, their leaders and community members planted 9,600 bulbs in Flagstaff Park, for the Queens Platinum Jubilee Celebrations in 2022. Photos appeared on the front page of the Berwick Advertiser!





During the year funds were raised for local and national charities. The Division took part in the World's Biggest Coffee Morning and held their event in Berwick Town Hall where almost £400 was raised due to a great team effort! Brownies made chocolate Santa sleighs which were delivered to the Peoples Kitchen in Newcastle and were




very well received. They also took part in Christian Aid's Climate Change Appeal. Guides voted to support Berwick Animal Rescue Kennels (BARK) for their Christmas good turn and a large amount of food and treats for the animals was delivered to their headquarters.



Despite the ongoing Covid crisis and a decrease in our numbers, Berwick upon Tweed Division has been proud to continue to offer our girls the opportunity to meet up indoors, outdoors or virtually, whenever possible.

By the end of the year we had enrolled and celebrated, as many new members joined all our units and 4 Guides had achieved their Bronze Award.







Alnwick Division

The Rainbows in Alnwick Division all enjoyed the ability to meet outdoors once Covid restrictions allowed us to do so. Units met on their local beach, in woodland and their local play park. Promises were made around beach fires, with S'mores and stunning sunsets, and under umbrellas in heavy rain. A new Rainbow Unit opened up later in the year and across the Division there have been several Bronze, Silver Awards presented. One Rainbow achieved her Gold Award and had a special Hidden Treasure-themed celebration at a playpark. When restrictions were lifted, one Rainbow unit visited Northumberland Zoo and has been fundraising to sponsor their chosen since then.

Alnwick Division Brownies also enjoyed meeting outdoors after several months of some units not being able to Zoom. Girls have been pond-dipping, had walks and fires by the river, built sandcastles and made s'mores on the beach, and played games and followed programme activities on the local school's field and playground. Once we were allowed indoors, girls have baked biscuits and decorated cakes, had a go at tie-dying using natural dyes and built structures out of fruit and veg. Two new Brownie units opened this year and across the Division several girls have achieved their Bronze and Silver Awards, with a couple even managing to gain their Gold Award.

Our Guides have met over Zoom, at the beach, and at a community orchard. They have had the opportunity to talk to our local MP over Zoom, do a Harry Potter-themed virtual tour (joined by the Brownies) and made salt scrubs via video conference. We have also done water sports, WW2 altar-fire cooking and taken part in several community events. When restrictions allowed us to meet indoors, all units have enjoyed being back indoors, especially as the nights were getting darker and colder. Several girls have been able to complete their Bronze Awards and many are working hard to achieve their Silvers and Golds. One Guide unit had a fantastic time at their Autumn residential at Kirknewton.

All sections massively enjoyed the Division Christmas Crafts afternoon and went home with some lovely things, and after a challenging year, it's been lovely to see all the girls enjoy themselves once more. Our longest serving leader, Madeline Russell retired at Christmas, after receiving her 40 year Long Service Award.

Ashington Division

Having been stored in a tin for nearly 20 years I have finally got round to sorting my collection of Guiding postage stamps. I was thrilled to discover the set of stamps issued to celebrate the first World Camp held after the foundation of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) in 1939 in Hungary. On the advice of Olave Baden-Powell the name Pax-Ting was adopted for the camp as this translated as Meeting of Peace. The four stamps are so uninspiring in appearance but what they signify is far from this. Despite the threat of World War 2, which broke out a month after the camp, 5,800 Guides from around the world enjoyed the thrills of international camp in the spirit of happy fellowship. Over the last year leaders have continued in the spirit of Pax-Ting giving unit members something to look forward to. Let's face it, we all need this, leaders most of all.

Next year may still have its challenges but together on our Guiding journey we can make it special for everyone.
